6.1 What ... like?

Form

what + to be + subject + like?

What	's (is) your teacher are his parents was your holiday were the beaches	like?	She's very patient. They're very kind. Wonderful. We swam a lot. OK, but some were dirty.
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Note

We don't use like in the answer. She's patient. NOT She's like patient.

Use

What ... like? means 'Describe somebody or something. Tell me about them. I don't know anything about them.'

Like in this question is a preposition, not a verb:

'What's Jim like?' 'He's intelligent and kind, and he's got lovely blue eyes.'

In the following sentences like is a verb:

'What does Jim like?' 'He likes motorbikes and playing tennis.'

Note

How's your mother? asks about health. It doesn't ask for a description. 'How's your mother?' 'She's very well, thank you.' 6.2. Comparative and superlative adjectives

She's taller than me.

London's more expensive than Rome.
